Suzanne Aubert's Resting Place

Suzanne Aubert – Meri Höhepa

A slab of Waitaha stone with a simple carved inscription marks the place where Suzanne Aubert is buried, beneath the Chapel floor at Our Lady's Home of Compassion, Island Bay. This specifically designed prayer space is open to the public each day and at other times by arrangement. The journey from her native France to this, her final resting place in Aotearoa New Zealand, is an extraordinary story of faithful courage. The lights embedded in the vaulted ceiling above her, reference the southern cross constellation – a poignant symbol that she rests among her people, in this land. All are welcome to visit and sit a while.
